

What we need

- A worship space for at least 600.
 - Our current setup accommodates ~ 450 counting Cry room and Chapel
 - We can seat ~ 600 using the triple classroom
 - Current Mass Sizes
 - Our Regular Sunday 10:30 service is 300 max 400
 - Sat Eve 160 Max 250
 - Sun Eve 136 Max 210
 - Daily Mass 20 30 (Chapel holds ~ 18-20)
 - It's not about just adding another Mass
- Incorporate our Icons and our Relics
- More parking
- Be able to use our facilities for what they were originally designed.
 - Social hall, classrooms etc.
 - The triple and double class rooms are also mini social halls.
- Maybe Replace temporary structures with permanent buildings
 - Modular Buildings
 - Storage containers

What we looked for


- Spent about 1 Hour at each church

Phase II: Why an Exclusive Worship space?


- It's always been the next Phase







Modified Cruciform 1


- Sanctuary / Altar moved toward crossing
- Side Trancepts face the altar







- Side Transepts face the altar




Modified Cruciform 3

Fan Shape





- Allows worshipers closer to altar



Gothic versus Romanesque Architecture


Romanesque


- The earliest churches were based on Greek temples and Roman basilicas (secular government buildings); essentially there was a substitution of a church plan for a temple plan: colonnades were shifted from the interior to the exterior; an arch was placed directly on a pier instead of placing a lintel directly on a pier (column)
- •The classic temple is a system of sturdy walls and colonnades all helping to sustain a solid roof. A Romanesque church follows essentially the same principles, except that an arch is placed over the colonnades.
- •All the parts of a Romanesque building contribute their share to the stability of the whole.
- •The structure stands through virtue of inertia.

Gothic

- In a Gothic church the highly organized framework of piers, arches and buttresses are organized so that the spaces of the wall and roof between them serve merely as an enclosure.
- A Gothic church is a skillfully balanced systems of thrusts and counterthrusts that are concentrated on special points of support.
- All the different levels of the church interior are brought into homogenous composition: great vaulting shafts tha articulate the massive piers rise from the floor; at the clerestory level these shafts become more decorative than supportive and spring from corbels in order to trace the vaulting that articulates each bay.
- Flying buttresses allowed the walls to be dissolved.


- Same Fan Style





- Reused furnishing from old church (Altar/ Ambo etc.)












• Pros:

- Three pane arch design carried out throughout the building
- Lots of windows
- Daily / Adoration chapel opened to main church like ours

- Inviting outdoor courtyard

• Cons

 Dark wood on ceiling and all walls – very dark

- Inadequate attempt at Radial pews
- Side Aisle pillars
 - very large
 - Could have been arched









What We Liked

- Modified cruciform maybe even more like Greek cross
- Pews
 - ***** Radial Pews *****
 - Color:
 - Not dark
 - not blond maybe with celtic cross or trinity knot on side
- Arched ceiling with paint and wood St Anne Tie in to our arches in our building
- Arch Side Aisle but smaller round pillar vs square pillar maybe faux marble like the savannah cathedral
- Stained glass surrounded by clear/translucent glass like Immaculate conception
- Focal Point Stained Glass windows: front and back walls, maybe the sides as well
- Faux stone work like St Teresa

What We Liked (cont)

- Veneration Niches for Relics / Icons
- Music up front
- Baptismal font up front Bishop Hartmeyer desire
- Place for the Icons
- Separate Day Chapel
- Training Room
- Drive through overhang
- Large Narthex like St James
- Working back sacristy with Sacrarium
- Reconciliation rooms
- Columbarium
- Choir Room

What we did not like

- Dark interior
- Too much wood
- Angled pews like Sacred Heart
- Traditional rectangle center aisle like St Julianna
- Optical Illusion in stairs, aisles and walls
- Price tag
